I. Note from the Mission Director

Transforming rural households through sustainable Community Institutions of the Poor

2016 marked NSRLM's fourth year. As we crossed this milestone, the State Mission looked ahead to the inclusive world we want, and refocused on the transformative power of rural population, particularly, women set at the heart of NRLM's Vision and Goals for poverty reduction through sustainable Institutions of the Poor.

Across the State, we see remarkable evidence of progress in poverty alleviation. Change is taking place at the household level and people have greater opportunities to realize their potential. At the same time, the State faces persistently high levels of inequality and exclusion. About 70% (Census 2011) constitute rural households in the State, where income is less equally distributed than ever today.

The defining challenge of our State Mission is to shift to state specific innovative models of sustainable development while also continuing with the existing strategy. Growth can be more inclusive and more sustainable, reducing poverty and inequality. And, by managing the critical assumptions, communities and institutions of the poor can become more resilient and better able to upkeep the progress they have made.

In the State Annual Review Meeting, where all the staff participated, it was recognized that no challenge can be dealt with in isolation; we need integrated thinking, planning, and action as fundamental to progress towards inclusive growth, better services, environmental sustainability, and financial security to the rural poor across the State.

The State Mission and the wider Mission Management Units are fully engaged in the National effort to shape NRLM's Goals into a transformative reality by 2025.

This year's annual report details our maturing structure of effective Mission Management Units, resourceful and enterprising Institutions of the Poor. It highlights the successful programmatic work in 18 Blocks under 9 Districts, from forming and strengthening

2900 SHGs into higher level federations; bolstering economic empowerment to boost rural household's income through Income Generating Activities; engaging community members as community cadres to increase leadership and nurturing of the community institutions; developing pool of human resource at the State and community level to support poverty alleviation programs; working with Agri & Allied Departments towards convergence; working with stakeholders to foster support and participations towards the program; and initiating communitization in line with NSRLM's "5-7 years in a Block Strategy". It also chronicles the continuing evolution of NSRLM, which is set out in our new Strategic Plan, and the alignment of all our efforts towards inclusive, sustainable, and resilient community institutions of the poor.

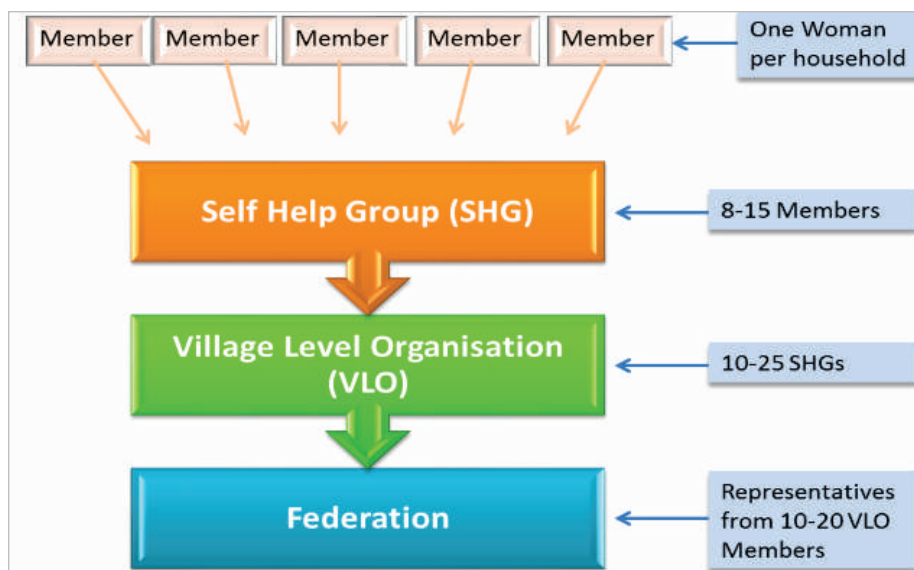

II. KEY ACTIVITIES in 2016-2017

a) SOCIAL MOBILIZATION, SOCIAL INCLUSION, INSTITUTION BUILDING AND CAPACITY BUILDING



Outcomes of FY 2016-17:

- Through intensive community mobilization {Community Resource Persons(CRP) rounds}, 15-20 days of Village Stay, Participatory Rural Appraisal (PRA) exercises, Community Sensitization through customized Information Education & Communication (IEC) materials and entry point activities, the State Mission covered 72 Villages in the 9 Intensive Blocks.
- 9660 poor households were mobilized into 1028 SHGs which have formed 16 Village Level Organisations (VLO) and 3 Cluster Level Federations (CLF).
- 9 State Master Trainers and 36 District Master Trainers in different thematic areas are in place as Human Resource Capital to support NRLM implementation in the State. They will form part of the State pool of Resource Team.
- 399 pool of Community/Village level Resource Persons {91 Community Resource Person (CRP), 165 Village Facilitators (VF) and 143 Master Book Keepers (MBK)} are mobilizing, promoting and nurturing Community Institutions.
- Training, strengthening and nurturing of Community Institutions (SHG/VLO/CLF) deepened in the existing 9 Resource Blocks.

b) FINANCIAL INCLUSION

Access to credit and other financial services is key to promoting livelihoods of poor. NRLM has a strong commitment in building access to financial services by poor. Keeping this in mind, the Financial Inclusion (FI) team has organized various programs in their respective resource and intensive blocks by creating a common platform for the bankers and the SHGs.

During such workshops, the importance of savings and bank transactions, documentation related to loan etc. are explained with focus on importance of timely repayment and recovery as key factors in building reputation among the SHGs with the banks including bank account opening towards Direct Benefit Transfer (DBT).

Field inspection to livelihood sites; discussion appraisal of credit inflow and scope and potential for capital infusion, financial/credit are some activities undertaken by the FI team and during workshops, success stories by the SHGs and VLOs are also presented.

Chief Manager lead bank has expressed that NRLM SHGs credit-linked with various banks have 100% repayment record and therefore banks are ready to assist the community and women groups. Branch Managers further encourage the SHGs and VLOs to visit the banks often to build up their confidence and also maintain a good relation with the bankers.

Account opening melas were successfully conducted in villages for SHGs where group bank account and individual bank account and Aadhar seeding in the bank account were explained and demonstrated during the campaign. Financial Literacy Camps organized by NSRLM in collaboration with banks and NABARD has successfully covered 220 NSRLM villages.

c) LIVELIHOODS

FY 2016-17 had seen major push from the Ministry for livelihoods interventions and support ensuring that the SHGs and VLOs in the State Mission are ready for layering activities. NSRLM worked towards strengthening its professionals in the same line of thought and action. One of the first activities was identifying a team of State Resource Persons (SRPs) and sending them for training conducted by the Ministry which was followed by the SRPs livelihoods training the Mission professionals who in turn transferred the knowledge to the SHGs and VLOs.

An exposure visit exclusively on Livelihoods was conducted for the 9 Block Program Managers of Resource Blocks to Jharkhand and Bongaigaon, Assam in the 2nd Quarter of FY 2016-17.

MoU with National Resource Organization (NSO), PRADAN

With support from the Ministry, the State Mission invited professionals from NSO PRADAN for 7 days livelihoods scoping study in the Resource Blocks of NSRLM. The scoping visit led to further discussions and an MoU was signed between NSRLM and PRADAN on 18th January 2017 at PRADAN Head Office New Delhi.

The first SRLM in the North East to enter into MoU with PRADAN, the State Mission expects the following outcomes through the partnership:

- Develop livelihoods related vision, approaches and strategies for the state
- Develop Annual Plan of action for rolling out livelihoods interventions for the next 2 years
- Creation of a livelihoods core group at the State level comprising of professionals from PRADAN-NSO, NSRLM and selected districts dealing with livelihoods, knowledge management and innovations and its effective functioning
- A cadre of trained staff at state and district level on various aspects of livelihoods
- Various knowledge materials such as training modules, resources, IEC materials etc. available for scaling up purpose
- Develop Livelihoods Groups and Collectives in the 9 Resource Blocks

Status of Farm and Non-farm implementation

Farm Livelihoods Implementation:

Continuing the partnership with North East Initiative Development Agency (NEIDA), 653 members of SHGs received training and material support for piggery intervention in Pfutsero Resource Block and Pungro.

The SHGs of Pfutsero resource block have been able to avail the training and extension services of KVK Porba Phek on good package of practices on cabbage, potato, peas, vermicompost. The 714 members who have availed the training have taken up improved methods of practices.

Non Farm:

The resource blocks with closer proximity to urban towns have taken up non-farm activities catering to the urban market demands. In Chumukedima Resource block, SHGs have been trained on detergent making and manufacturing aloe vera soaps. With the true concept of helping each other, SHGs who are already taking up such activities have gone to other villages and provided trainings to fellow SHG members with further hand holding support from the Mission staff.

Hiring facility has come up in VLOs under Chumukedima Resource block where plastic chairs, tents and tables have been procured from the community investment fund and hired on payments during events in and around the village.

Convergence:

- Food Preservation training in convergence with Horticulture Department, Mokokchung
- Piggery Management training in convergence with Veterinary Department, Mokokchung & NABARD.
- Market linkages for vegetables and tapioca (Dry) with vendors and customers at Mokokchung Town.
- Mushroom cultivation training at Horticulture Office, Mokokchung.

Plan of Action

For a state like Nagaland, Rural livelihoods enhancement and sustainable livelihoods is critical for overall development of human development indicators such as access to health, education, nutrition. The State Mission plans to develop scalable models of livelihoods practices particularly in the 9 resource blocks of NRLM. According to the activity work plan for FY 2017-18, field intervention will begin towards the end of 2nd Quarter as the 1st Quarter will focus on induction, training and immersion of Livelihoods specialists.

The 1st & 2nd Quarter of FY 2017-18 will focus on conceptualizing, identifying and developing roll out strategy through consultative workshops and baseline survey by professionals identified by NSO PRADAN. The State Mission will identify community resource persons-livelihoods (CRP-Ild), training and capacity building, immersion and exposure visits for development of these community cadres.

The above mentioned livelihoods activities will be implemented with the support of NSO partner PRADAN and National Resource Persons (NRPs) as well as with the livelihoods team of NMMU. In addition, collectivization of the existing poor households into Producers Groups for promotion of livelihoods and focus on deepening interventions in existing livelihoods practices will be the focus of the State Mission. Formation of at least one producers group from each Resource Block and identification of five commodities for scaling up production, backward and forward linkages, value addition, skill enhancement, through convergence with line departments like the department of Veterinary & A.H, department of Agriculture and Horticulture, ICAR and other line departments will be given priority.

With a dedicated team of livelihoods on board, the State Mission plans to be able to fulfill the readiness criteria of Mahila Kisan Sashaktikaran Pariyojana (MKSP) and seek approval for MKSP project towards the end of the next financial year.

d) SYSTEMS

i. Human Resource

Nagaland State Rural Livelihoods Mission has scaled up to additional 9 Intensive Blocks in FY 2016-17 and the State Mission has positioned 1 Block Program Manager (BPM), 3 Area Coordinators (ACs) and 1 Accountant cum Data Entry Operator (DEO) in each Intensive Block. The Block teams are engaged in CRP rounds, follow-up and nurturing of the CRP round covered villages, through promotion of higher level institutions.

The Internal Community Resource Persons (ICRPs) are engaged in intensive mobilization efforts and promotion of SHGs through the CRP rounds. There are at least 10 ICRPs from each Resource Blocks who are immersed and trained at National Resource Organization (NRO) before engaging them.

In-house Training was conducted for the new recruits by the State Resource Team (SRT), on theory and classroom learning covering NRLM thematic areas along with concept, characteristics, PRA and Field Visit.

The induction process continued with 15 Days of Village Stay in select villages across the State where there is presence of strong Community Institutions (SHGs, VLOs and CLF). Home Visits, attending meetings with Community Institutions, building rapport, documentation and reporting are part of the activities during such stay.

ii. Knowledge Management & Communication

To ensure timely and correct dissemination of information to target groups and institutions, a number of IECs in various formats have been developed, compiled and contextualized for more effective education of stakeholders during FY2016-'17.

1. Display charts with jackets have been printed and distributed so that the staff as trainers and resource persons including community cadres will have a cache of knowledge materials for training and sensitization purposes.
2. Brochure on **Unorganized Workers** in collaboration with North East Network (NEN) has been compiled, printed and dispatched.
3. The 2nd edition of the **Training Manual on Self Help Groups**, a module for knowledge basics on institutions of poor with sessions on various training methods and processes.

The manual will be used by trainers and community cadres during sensitization and mobilization in the new Blocks to be taken up.

4. Customized IEC board containing information on NRLM and Self Help Groups has been developed to be placed in all villages under the Resource and Intensive Blocks under NRLM.

iii. Monitoring & Evaluation/MIS

1. MIS in the National Portal

Ensuring transparency and accountability of the program through monthly update online of the Program Progress and PMO Activities (profiling of SHGs, and their higher level federations; Community Cadres Profile; profiling of existing Commodities/Products /Services in each block; updating SHG profiles with Aadhar and Account Number of individual member; and uploading of Training and Capacity Building activities)

2. Rolling Out Transaction Based SHG Accounting System

Transaction based SHG Accounting System is rolled out in all the Resource Blocks. In line with the objectives and goals of the Mission towards communitization, a member from each Village Level Organization (VLO) has been trained on the transaction based MIS who manages the data. The System focuses on eSHG and eTransaction component where all SHGs are brought to a single database with unique identity of SHG and its members; and ensures there is no duplication of membership in multiple SHGs. The State Mission uses the data for effectively monitoring and supporting the SHGs in the state, while the Community Institution will use the data to assess their progress and accessing and delivering financial and livelihood services to their SHG members.

3. Training of staff and community resource persons in MIS reporting

The dynamic and evolving process of the Mission requires periodic capacity buildings of the staff for continuous quality support to the program. As such State Level MIS training cum review meeting has been conducted quarterly for the MIS team for quality data management & timely reporting and to identify lacunas for rectification and improvement.

4. Internal Reviews and Learning

To facilitate resolution of program related and CBOs issues, monthly internal reviews system through monthly review meeting and meticulous data management have been instituted at BMMU, DMMU and SMMU levels. These reviews were conducted and

attended by all key mission staff. Using MIS data, narrative monthly field reports and issues thrown up by the Mission Units and Community Institutions critical issues affecting program implementation is identified and resolved. This also have helped act as a forum for cross learning among the mission staff.

e) SKILLS

Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana (DDU-GKY) is the skilling and placement initiative of the Ministry of Rural Development (MoRD), Government of India. DDU-GKY has its origins in the Aajeevika Skills programme and the 'Special Projects' component of the Swarnjayanti Gram Swarozgar Yojana (SGSY). The scheme focuses on catering to the occupational aspirations of rural youth and enhancing their skills for wage employment.

Implementation of DDU-GKY involves State Governments, Technical Support Agencies like the National Institute of Rural Development and Panchayati Raj (NIRD & PR), and Project Implementing Agencies (PIAs).

DDU-GKY envisions to being a Centre of Excellence and a global leader for policy design and implementation in skilling and placement linked skill programs for rural youth of the developing countries.

Mission

To provide technical services such as monitoring, evaluation, training, content development, and research for the programs undertaken by Government at national level to enable rural poor youths including socially disadvantaged groups to secure a better future.

DDU-GKY in Nagaland

Nagaland State Rural Livelihoods Mission (NSRLM), the implementing agency of DDU-GKY in Nagaland worked towards the preparedness of rolling out during FY 2016-17. The human resource dedicated for DDU-GKY attended various workshops and capacity building events conducted by the Ministry throughout the year. The State Mission was able to develop its action plan which was approved in the Ministry's empowered committee meeting held on 25th January 2017. As per the target allocation for the State, the Mission has a task of engaging Project Implementing Agencies (PIAs) who are registered with MoRD for training and placement of 6924 rural youths till the year 2020.

With the burgeoning number of educated unemployed, uneducated, school and college drop-out youths in the state, DDU-GKY has a potential role to play in motivating these

youths for meaningful employment both within and outside the state. This urgency of providing employable skills and providing placement to the youths of Nagaland is being mentioned in the vision 2030 document of Nagaland as well.

As DDU-GKY is to be implemented in partnership with PIAs, the State Mission will continue to build the capacity of local PIAs for implementing the project. Consultative workshops will be conducted with the PIAs who have done similar skill development and placement with other agencies like NSDC, PMKVY etc. With the objective of promoting good performing local PIAs, the State Mission will give priority to these local PIAs which in turn will ensure better transparency and accountability.

The State Mission plans to sanction projects under DDU-GKY by the 2nd Quarter of FY 2017-18 towards meeting its objective of providing training and placement to 6924 rural youths in the state by 2020.

f) SVEP

Start-Up Village Entrepreneurship Program (SVEP) the non-farm funding component of NRLM has a vision

- To help the rural poor come out of poverty by helping them set up enterprises and provide support till the enterprises stabilize.
- To provide them with business skills, exposure, loans for starting and business support during the first critical six months of the enterprises by using the NRLM SHGs and their federations. These skills shall be imparted by local youth who shall be trained in business management, monitoring and support using ICT and audio-visual aids. These local CRP-EPs shall also provide support to the enterprises.

Status and achievements:

Started during FY 2015-16, SVEP implementation was approved in the pilot blocks of Jakhama and Chumukedima Resource Blocks. With the objective to nurture and develop enterprises in these two blocks over 4 years period, Entrepreneurs Associates (EA) was taken on board as the Project Implementing Agency (PIA) through an MoU. Since then, the PIA along with the SVEP block team of NSRLM have steadfastly worked towards developing a detailed project report (DPR) which was approved on 9th August 2016. Prior to the approval of DPR, village intensive SVEP campaigns were held involving the youth organization, SHGs, VLOs, village council and church leaders throughout the two blocks. This was followed by baseline survey to understand the existing enterprises and also potential for new enterprises. The baseline survey was the benchmark for developing the DPR which was approved by the Ministry. Under the banner of SVEP, market fairs were held to generate interest among the SHG members and their families which was well responded by the community.

As part of a capacity building program initiated by the Ministry, the SVEP team from PIA and the State Mission attended the training and certification program at Ahmedabad, Gujarat

from 26th September 2016- 3rd October 2016. The CRP-EPs were identified, screened followed by written examination and interview conducted by the respective block teams. The selected cadres were then given intensive in house training of 1 week before being deployed in the field.

Simultaneously, the SHG leaders, VLO leaders and Block Level Federation leaders were trained on fund management of Community investment fund (CEF). During the last quarter of FY 2016-17, an amount of Rs. 1 crore was sanctioned to the Block Level Federation of Jakhama block as CEF which will be utilized as loans to the entrepreneurs. The year saw the identification of potential entrepreneurs, development of business proposals and screening of the business plans by the business plan approval committee comprising of leaders of VLOs and BLF/Nodal VLOs. Loan sanctioning committee has been formed and the first sitting for loan approval to the entrepreneurs will be during the 1st quarter of FY 2017-18.

Plan of Action

The State Mission has an ambitious plan of coming up with 1600 and 2400 rural enterprises in Jakhama and Chumukedima Resource Blocks within 4 years. This is expected to trigger entrepreneurship oriented goals among the rural youths- educated and the uneducated across the state. From the pilot blocks, model enterprises are envisioned for youths from the rest of the blocks to come, learn and emulate. With the Community Resource Persons-Enterprise Promotion (CRP-EP) model of implementation, the local rural youths will be used as agents of change in the other blocks for which continuous capacity building and handholding support is emphasized on the CRP-EPs besides promotion of enterprises. Further, the leaders of SHGs, VLOs and Cluster/Block Level Federations will continue to play vital role in monitoring of enterprises and management of Community Enterprise Fund (CEF) through which capital resources are sanctioned for taking up enterprises.

g) RSETI

RSETIs are institutions designed to ensure necessary skill training and skill up-gradation of the rural BPL youth to mitigate the unemployment problem in the country. These institutes are promoted and managed by Banks with active support from the central and state governments. Training costs incurred by the implementing banks are reimbursed to the host bank by the government of India through the state government. Further, after successful completion of the training by the rural youths, banks are mandated to provide credit linkage for the trainees to start their own entrepreneurial ventures.

In Nagaland, SBI has been able to promote and manage one RSETI at Jalukie under Peren district. Efforts to open similar RSETIs in other districts have not been successful despite push from the Government.

As per report submitted, during FY 2016-17, RSETI Peren had successfully conducted 15 training programs in which 336 rural youths were trained. Post training 30 candidates

were provided credit linkage after due appraisals of their business plans. For the FY 2017-18, the institute has set a target of training 380 candidates at its campus.

Plans

The State Mission will focus on strengthening the existing RSETI for quality training and credit linkage support from the banks. Understanding that there is absolute need for training, the State Mission will push the Government both State and Central for setting up more RSETIs in the State. NSRLM will also explore partners for off campus training to cater to more youths in the other districts of the State. Quarterly review meeting of SLBC RSETI sub-committee will be ensured for effective monitoring and support. In addition, the State Mission will ensure participation in DCC meetings to sensitize the bankers on the credit worthiness of the candidates who successfully complete training at the RSETI.

III. CONVERGENCE

IV. SNIPPETS AND REPORTS FROM THE BLOCKS

MON

Mon Block

CASE STUDIES

DZUKHOUPA SHG

VLO : Qasu

Leshemi Village, Pfutsero Block, Phek

The Dzükhoupa SHG of Leshemi Village under Pfutsero Block was formed on 5th Nov. 2002. The group consists of 10 members with three members enlisted in the executive body i.e president, secretary and treasurer. Their sole purpose of forming Self Help Group was to uplift the financial status of each member.

THE INITIAL DAYS

Since all the members in the group are under-matriculate and with no permanent source of income, the members initially decided to collect ₹10 as membership fee and ₹50 as monthly saving. With few thousands in hand the group took up income generating activities as well as daily wage labour to generate Group Corpus Fund. In due course of time, they realized the need for a bank account. The saving account was opened in NSCB at Pfutsero.

The Dzükhoupa SHG actively take part in social activities on voluntary basis such as cleaning the village, donating cash or kind to the sick and elderly people in the village. However, due to lack of financial and moral support from the NGOs and government although they were initially promoted and endorsed by Social Welfare department under 'Anganwadi', the group could not do much in uplifting the members' living standards with their mere income.

NRLM INTERVENTION

With the entry of NSRLM in the village, the group came to learn more about the importance of Self Help Group and were motivated to achieve their goal of providing financial security to each member. As the sole objective of NRLM is to uplift the rural people i.e poorest of the poor, the group decided to come under the NSRLM fold and strictly follow the norms and guidelines given by the Mission i.e., the Panchasutra.

After the intervention of NSRLM, the group not

only received financial and moral support but was also given constant training and nurturing. The group started maintaining proper records books and practiced regular inter-loaning amongst themselves with lesser interest. This way they could make regular and timely repayment which enabled them to receive credit linkage from the bank. Their member monthly saving has increased to ₹300 at present. The group conducts weekly meetings and rotates leadership every two years. To ensure financial transparency in group fund, audit is carried out on half-yearly basis.

ACTIVITIES AS A GROUP

The Dzükhoupa SHG's main income generating activities sources are banana plantation, tree beans (*yongchak*), Naga dal, weaving, cardamom plantation etc. The group was awarded by ATMA a sum of ₹10,000 for outstanding performance in IGA. The group availed loan of ₹80,000 from NSCB Pfutsero and invested the said amount in the purchase of a house at Seikhazou Colony, Kohima at ₹6 lakhs which currently generates monthly house rent of ₹3000. The Dzükhoupa SHG current corpus is over ₹20 lakhs from various sources such as credit linkage, group IGA, loan interests, CIF interest, RF etc.

Mrs. Cusapalu Chiero Muzayi SHG

Mrs. Cusapalu Chiero is a member of Muzayi SHG under Ciepi VLO, hailing from Porba Village under Pfutsero Block, Phek District. She is married with six children (5 daughters and a son)



BEFORE JOINING SHG

She was born on the 12th of September, 1975 to Mr. Veswupra & Mrs. Huchosalu Dzudo. She is the third among nine siblings. Due to harsh financial problems, she could not even avail basic education. She had to help her parents in everyday field activities. Her family faced untold hardships owing to poverty but with the earning from daily wage activities, her siblings could access basic education.

She got married at the young age of 17 to Mr. Kuhusayi Chiero, who himself is a cultivator. Marriage did not improve her condition as now she had to fulfill the demands of their children in pursuing education. She somehow managed with the little that they got from selling sticky rice cakes, vegetables and pickles, weaving, etc. As the family became dependent on her sources of income, she could no longer spare time to take care of herself.

AFTER JOINING SHG

She joined an SHG in 2004 but due to lack of proper nurturing, members began to leave the group. With the coming of NSRLM, the members once again got together and also encouraged more women to join the group. Her group members began to earn wages and with monthly savings they began to start inter-lending.

She took loan and bought a pig through which she got a small profit. Since then she has taken loans for various activities and she rears four to five pigs and 40 to 50 chickens every year. In 2015, she got an award for Best Cultivator in her village from VCC where she got ₹1000 as cash award. She also received a cash award of ₹22,200 for best Cardamom Plantation from Central Spices Board. From 2016-2017 she has sold cardamom worth ₹2,80,000, kiwi fruit worth ₹1,10,000 and other fruits and vegetables such as tree tomatos, beans etc. for ₹ 95,000. She also gets yearly income by selling cardamom suckers amounting to ₹10,000. Being an active member in the group, she attends meetings regularly and also saves regularly as she now knows the benefit of Self Help Groups. Her life has improved drastically and she now gets leisure time as well. Her children are well educated and the eldest is now working as a radiologist.

She believes that through the SHG movement under NRLM, many women like her can also come out of poverty and therefore more women should be encouraged to join an SHG and come under the fold of the Mission.

V. Way Forward (Programs)

- Promotion and nurturing of higher level institutions will continue in all the Intensive Blocks
- Intensive strategy towards saturated mobilization, formation and nurturing of community institutions (SHG/VLOs) will be underway in the new blocks
- Increase access to credit and finance through engagement of TSA empanelled by NMMU/MoRD and creating platforms for universal financial inclusion
- Increase number of community cadres and deployment of senior Community Resource Persons (CRPs) as Mission staff at Resource Blocks in concurrence with the goals and objectives of the Mission towards communitization of the BMMUs from the third year onwards (5-7 Years in a Block Strategy)
- Promotion of Livelihoods in 9 Resource Blocks through a dedicated implementation architecture
- Enhanced program quality through engagement of SMMU team in Quarterly Reviews, Mid-term Evaluation and Year-end Evaluation to strengthen program quality
- Enhanced Capacity of Community Institution towards innovative and sustainable business idea in one model Resource Block
- Diversify resource base of Community Institutions through convergence and facilitate access to universal entitlements
- Develop customized IEC materials (short videos/clips) on program implementation and its impact

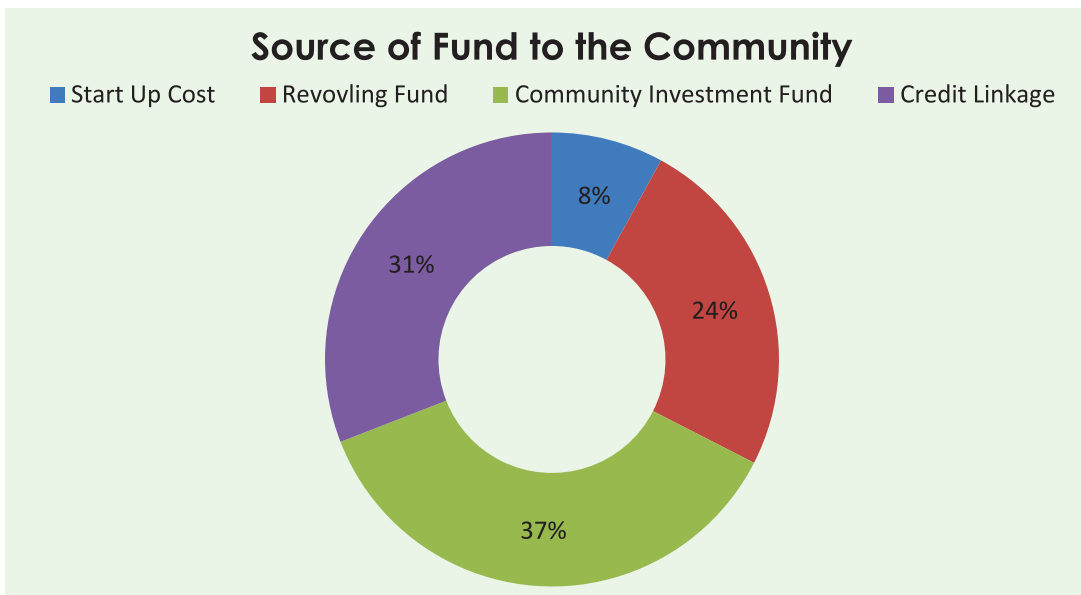
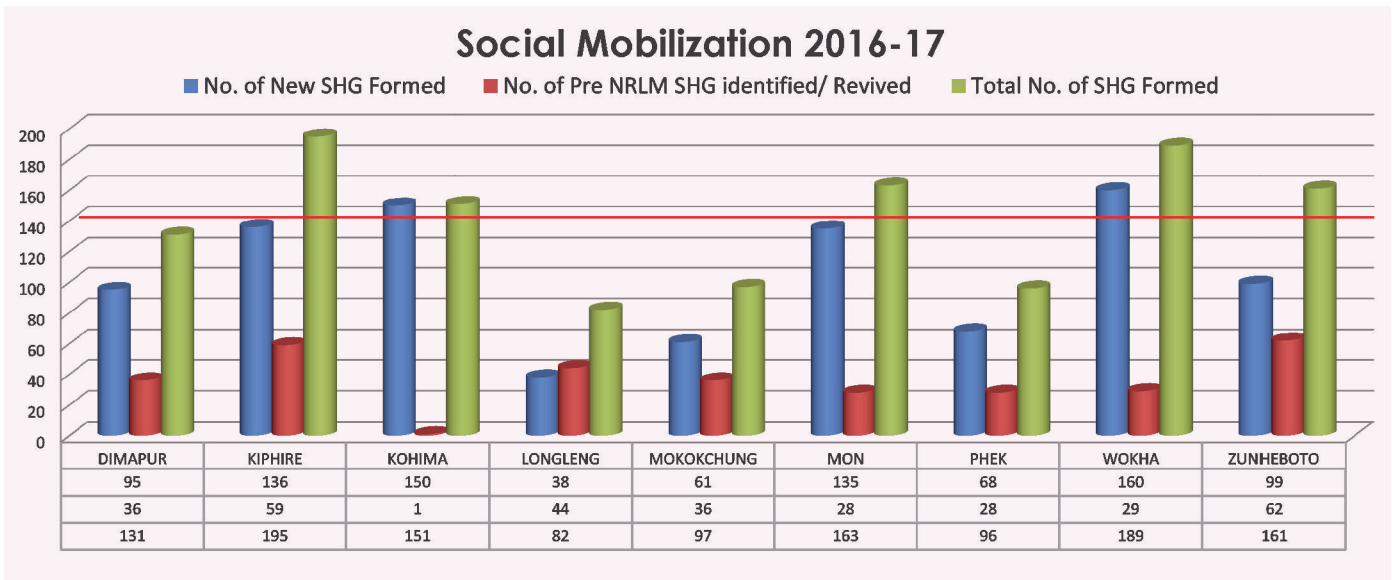
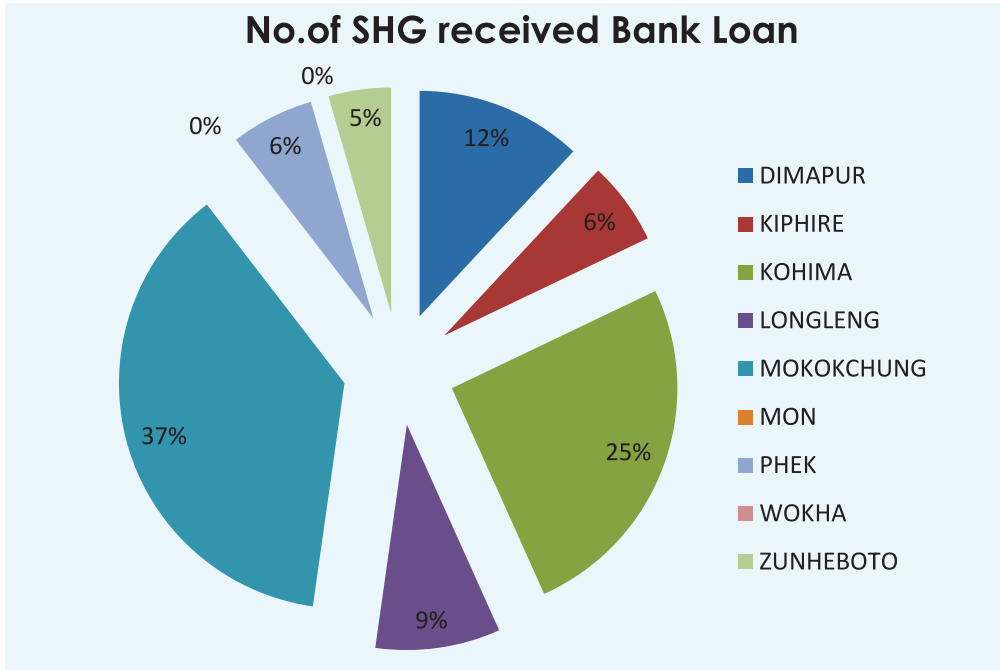
